

Muskingum County Courthouse

The Muskingum County Courthouse is a historic building in Zanesville, Ohio. It was designed by T.B. Townsend and H. E. Myer, and built in 1877 with stone, brick, and slate in the Second Empire architecture style. The building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is located at 4th and Main Streets.

Through the holiday season, the Muskingum County Courthouse is the focal point of our town's "A Storybook Christmas". During this time, you can view a Music and Light show nightly which features over 5 million color combinations.






On February 20, 1962 John Glenn woke up, showered and ate a breakfast of steak, scrambled eggs, toast, orange juice and coffee. This day was a very important day for John Glenn. It was the day of the Mercury 6 launch. By the time the sun had come up John was dressed in his 20 pound space suit and prepared to get into the very snug space capsule. The engineers and scientists at Mission Control would guide John's journey from the ground although John was an excellent pilot and well prepared for this space journey.

John Glenn sat inside the Friendship 7 capsule at the tip of a 90 foot rocket used to propel the capsule into space. His good friend Scott Carpenter said to John, "Godspeed John Glenn," then at 9:47 A.M. the Friendship 7 blasted off into the sky.

> Five minutes after liftoff the Friendship 7 entered its orbital path around the Earth. John would travel around the world 3 times in 88 minutes about 86,000 miles across the Atlantic Ocean, Africa, the Indian Ocean. Australia and the United States. John was the first American to eat in space. He squeezed applesauce into his mouth through a tube.

> Nearly five hours after its launch, Friendship 7 fell toward Earth. The U.S. destroyer Noa spotted the Friendship 7 and picked up John Glenn hoisting him to the deck of the ship. It was a very happy day for John and all Americans who followed his flight.

-POTTERY-

In Southeastern Ohio, the raw material clay was taken from the ground by pioneers and farmers who used it to make practical household items. It soon grew into an entire industry with skilled craftsmen hand making and painting attractive dinnerware, delicate art pottery, sturdy stoneware crocks and decorative ceramic tile.

Today, pottery is still made in the community of Muskingum County and has become a proud symbol of our local heritage and culture; it has become our tradition.






The Lorena Sternwheeler is moored at Zane's Landing Park at the West end of Market Street in Downtown Zanesville and offers excursions on the Muskingum River. She can carry 70 passengers and is 104 feet long, 17 feet wide, and weighs 59 tons. The hull is 68.5 feet and draws 2.5 feet of water.

The current Lorena Sternwheeler was introduced to Zanesville in 1976 for the bicentennial of the United States. Originally known as "Bryce M" in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, the boat was renamed "Lorena" after the sweetheart of a popular Civil War song written by Zanesville native Henry De Lafayette Webster. The boat navigated the Arkansas, Mississippi, Ohio and Muskingum Rivers during its two week journey to Zanesville.

CONESTOGA WAGONS


Conestoga wagons originally were used in Eastern Pennsylvania to haul goods from Conestoga to Philadelphia in the early 1700's. They had red painted wheels, with a blue body and a white canvas cover over the wagon.

Conestoga wagons came in various sizes, just like trucks today, some were used on farms like pick-up trucks and others were the tractor trailers of their time, large heavy duty wagons hauling goods west and east along the National Road. The large ones on the National Road were 14 to 16 feet long and able to haul 6 to 8 tons of goods being drawn by teams of oxen, mules or horses.

Since the lead animal was on the left, the wagon drivers would walk or ride on the left, this meant that if the driver needed to pass someone he would pass them on the left and drive on the right side of the road. This is thought to be how the custom of driving on the right hand side of the road began in the U. S. When going down a steep hill or if the wagon began moving too fast the driver could use a chain on the back wheel, called a wheel lock chain, so that it would no longer turn but begin to slide, slowing down the wagon so that it would not run over the team of animals.

Conestoga wagons were used extensively along the National Road during the 1800's as the major form of transportation for all goods needed in the West and fresh farm foods to fill the tables in the eastern cities.

MASK MASK

What you will need to create your own mask:

Scissors, a hole punch, some string, tape, and crayons or markers.

At the Zanesville Museum of Art there are many masks on display including this one made in Indonesia during the late 19th- and early 20th-Century. This handmade mask is carved from wood and decoratively painted to depict a beautiful Indonesian woman. Masks like this one are worn on the face and used in ceremonial dances. Although this mask depicts a young woman, masks can also depict animals and other fantastical creatures.

What type of mask can you create?

What to Do:

- **Step 1** Decide whether your mask will depict a human, animal, or creative, fantastical creature.
- **Step 2** Color your mask using an array of bright colors.
- **Step 3** Cut out the mask on the outside black line. Then cut out the holes for the eyes and mouth.
- **Step 4** Cover the circles on each side of the mask with clear tape. Put tape on both the front and the back of the paper.
- **Step 5** Using a hole punch, punch out the circles to make holes on each side where you will attach your string.
- **Step 6** Cut two 18-inch pieces of string. Tie the end of each piece of string through a hole on the side of the mask. Make sure your knot will not come out.

Step 7 Try on your mask!


